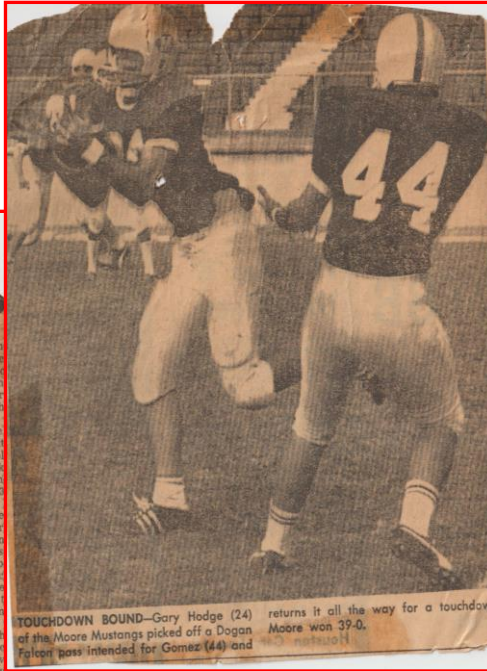

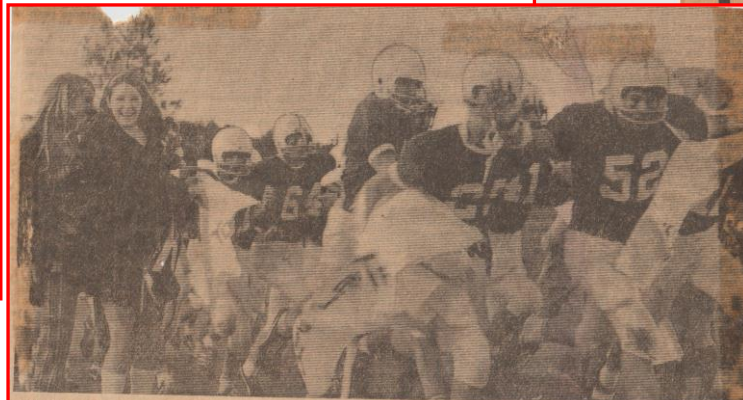

Vikings Down Hogg, Ponies Blank Dogan

The Hogg Razorbacks went down to the Boulder Vikings and the Dogan Falcons lost to the Moore Mustangs in junior high football play Thursday afternoon.

Bad luck and a team of tighting Boulder Vikings moved by Hogg's downfall as they tried to get on the winning track for the first time this year. Boulder, who won the contest by a score of 14-0, jumped into the lead when Lonzo Clark, defensive halfback, intercepted a Razorback pass and raced to the end zone 62 yards away without being touched. The tally came with 2:38 left in the third quarter and put the Vikings ahead by a score of 6-0.

Prior to this time, the game belonged to the Razorbacks. They were able to control the ball most of the time; they just couldn't do anything with it.

The Vikings scored again in the fourth quarter when they recovered a Hogg fumble at the three yard line. Mike Johnson made the first try for a score but was unable to get past the line of scrimmage when a tough Razorback defense stacked up on then quarterback Larry Hartsfield was dropped for a stray Falcon pass and scampered loss of four on the next play. The Vikings had the ball on third down at the seven yard line when Hartsfield tossed to the Charles Smith waiting in the end zone. That made the score 12-0 favor of Boulder, and the Vikings tacked on two conversion points to make the score 14-0 with 53 seconds left to play.

The victory was Boulder's second making their record 2-1-1 while Hogg dropped to 0-4-0. The Razorbacks' Skippy Cswaykus was clearly the standout as he rushed for a total of 53 yards, most of the yardage coming in the second half.

The Moore Mustangs crushed the Dogan Falcons, 21-0, while boosting their conference up to 3-1-0.

The first score came in the first quarter when halfback Gary Hodge found Clark Ridley on a pass play that was good for 40 yards and six points. Later, in the second quarter, defensive halfback Randy Hill intercepted

pered 40 yards to the 7 yard line and Darrel Hurt ran it in from there. Gary Hodge kicked his second conversion point of the day to make the score 14-0.

It stood like that until late in the fourth quarter, fullback Earl Campbell romped around left end for twenty yards bringing the ball to the 3 yard line. Hodge ran it in from there and again kicked to make the score 21-0.

The win brought Moore's record to a stately 3-1-0; their only loss was at the hands of the Hubbard Huskies. Dogan now holds a record of 1-3-0.

The Hogg eighth graders won 12-0.

Gentlemen, Drill Team, and cannon crew. Some of these organizations will only have to change their name, while others will also have to change their uniforms.

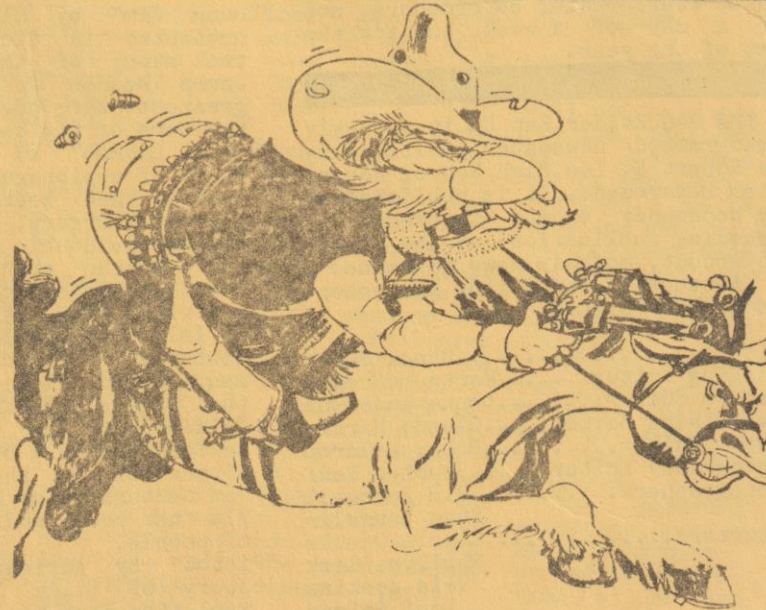
Mr. Pete Martinez, band director, has designed a new overlay for the band uniforms and is now working on a new fight song. The mascot on the

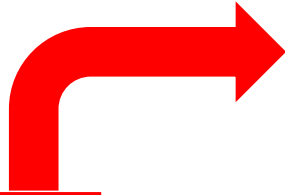
fire the cannon. They have no new name yet, but are expected to have some recommendations soon.

The Robert E. Lee Cannoneers, in firing the cannon, opened the Rose Parade festivities at the Rose Stadium.

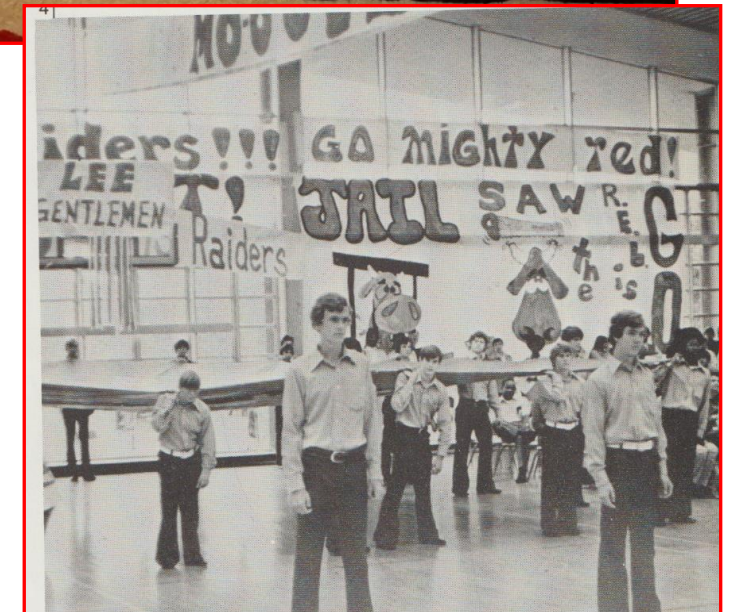
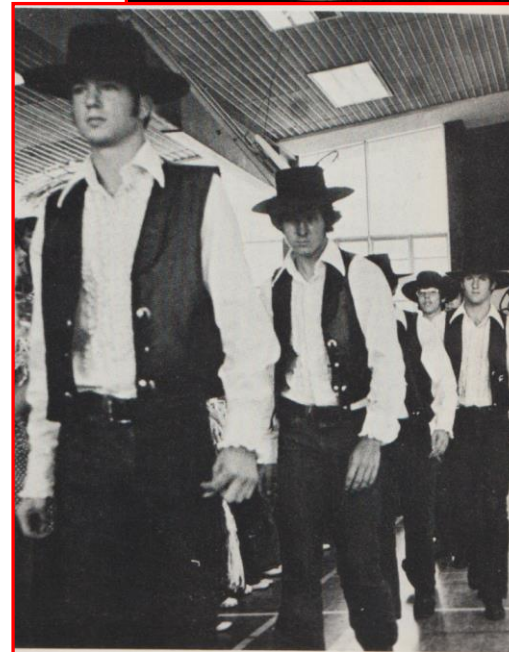
The group, sponsored by Bob Lyche, led the 84 parade units. They were part of the activities because of an invitation to them from the Rose Festival Association.

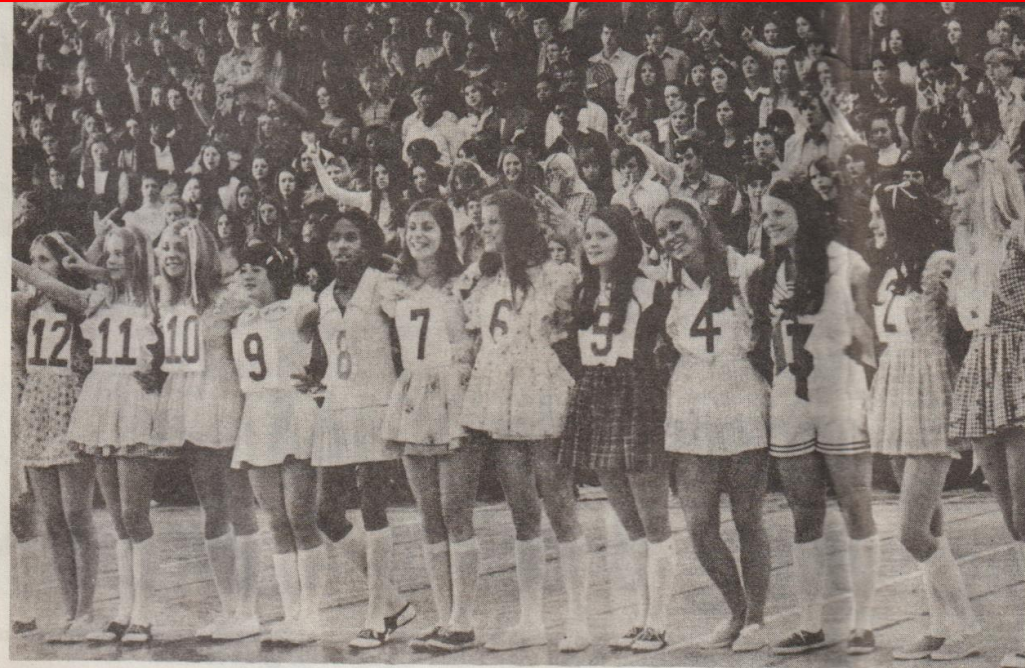

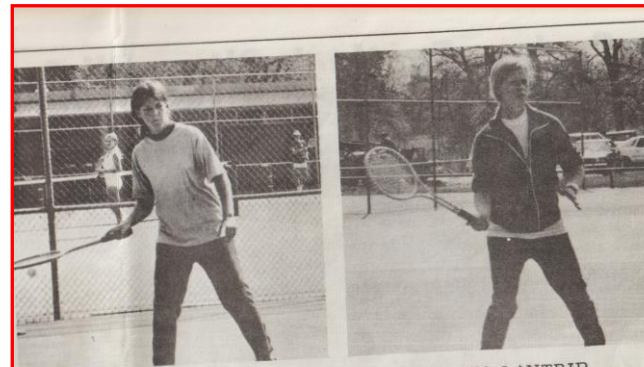

The track team has represented Lee in three meets this season and has three more to go this year.

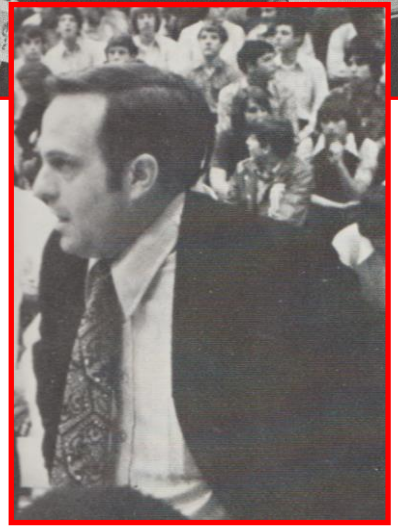
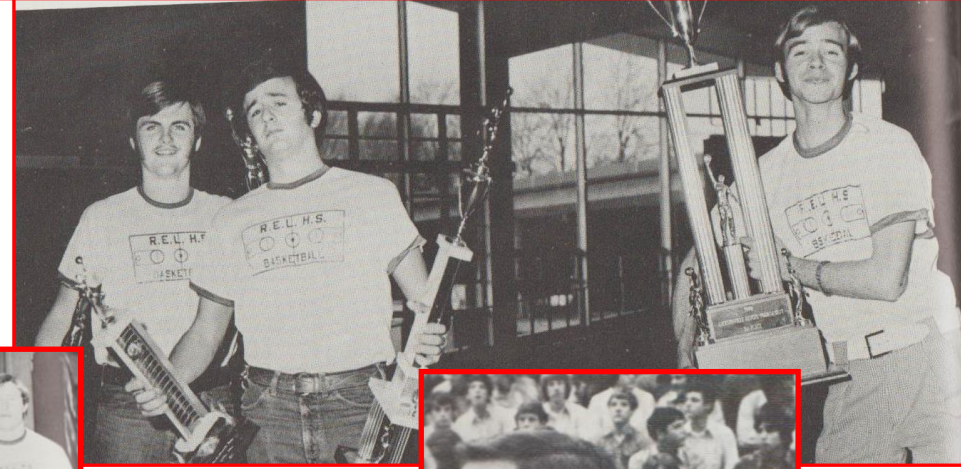
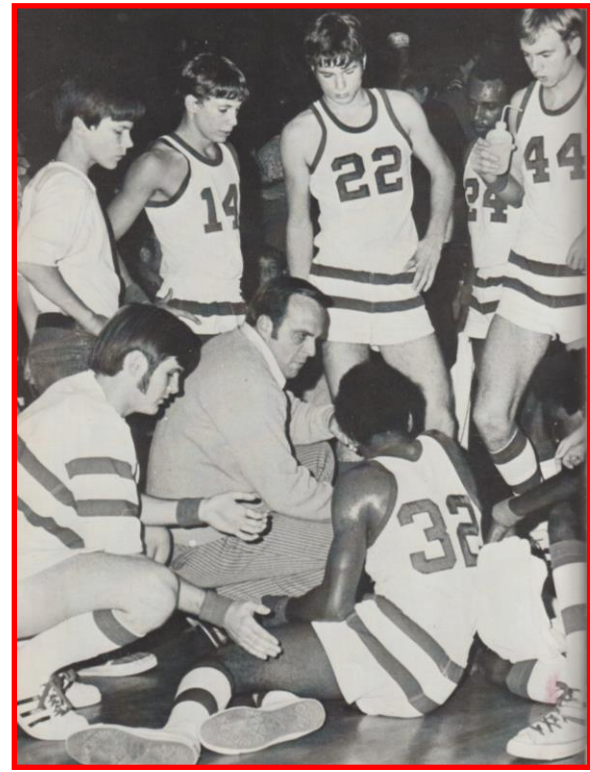

Pole vaulter Bubba Dunn took fourth at Piney Woods with a jump of 12 feet.

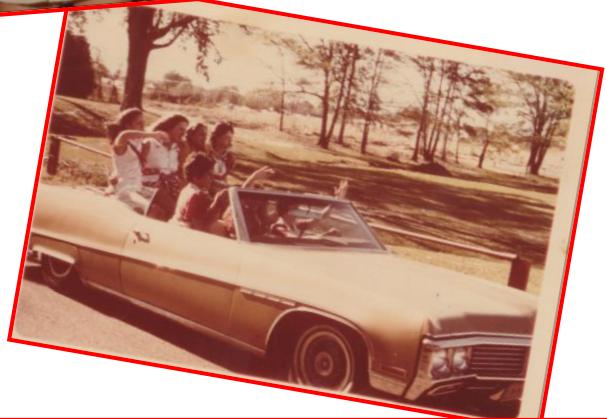
